History



The Town of Manlius was established in 1794, is approximately 54 square miles and has a population of around 32,370 according to the latest census (2010).

The Town of Manlius is located in Central New York within Onondaga County, and is an eastern suburb of the City of Syracuse. The Town of Manlius is home to the villages of Fayetteville, Manlius and Minoa, and to the East Syracuse-Minoa and Fayetteville-Manlius School Districts. Within its boundaries are state parks, village parks, a medical center, shopping plazas, and recreational areas.



Prior to 1985, the three villages each maintained police departments which also provided police services to citizens residing outside the villages. In 1985, the Town and the three villages entered into a joint municipal agreement to provide police services for both town and village residents and became known as the Town of Manlius Police Department.

Today, the Town of Manlius Police Department serves over 32,000 residents, and is the primary full service law enforcement agency for the three Villages and the Town. The agency responds to an average of 20,100 dispatched calls for service a year, provides marked patrol services, investigative and juvenile operations, school resource officers and a vast array of services to the citizens of the jurisdiction.

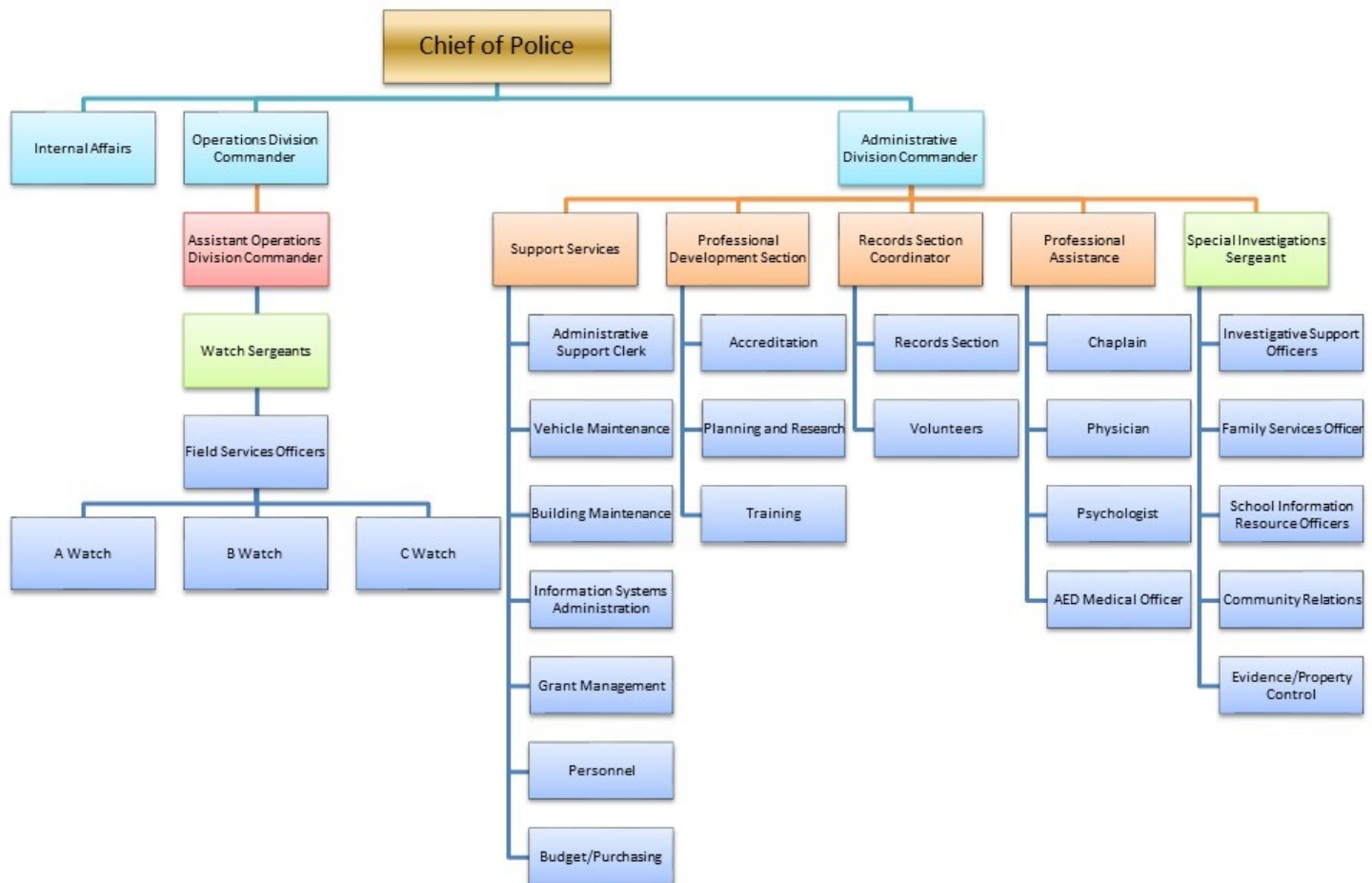

Organization



The Town of Manlius Police Department is a paramilitary organization that uses a typical hierarchical structure for its routine operations. There is one chief, two captains, one lieutenant, six sergeants, twenty-seven officers, nine civilians (both full and part-time), and a police chaplain. The department is comprised of two divisions: administrative and operations.

The administrative division is responsible for fiscal and property management, personnel, recruiting, training, planning, research, crime analysis, police vehicle acquisition and maintenance, law enforcement accreditation, network systems, inventory control, juvenile operations, public information, crime prevention and community relations.

The operations division is responsible for providing continuous patrol coverage, traffic operations, bicycle patrol, investigations of all crimes and serious incidents, evidence collection and preservation, and property security.

Accreditation

CALEA Accreditation

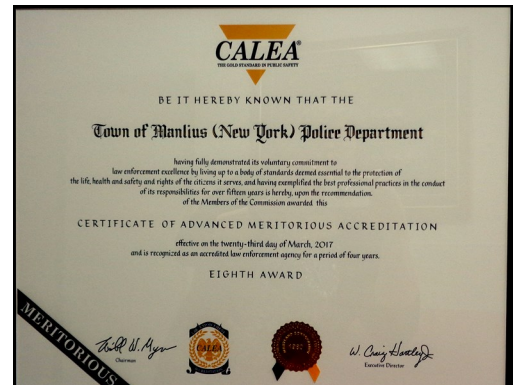


The Commission on Accreditation of Law Enforcement Agencies (CALEA) provides international accreditation which is a proven management model that provides for the framework to ensure:

- Efficient use of resources and service delivery improvements.
- Policies and practices that are consistently reviewed and updated.
- Verification from independent outside assessors to ensure trust and transparency.
- Greater accountability within the agency.
- Reduced risk and liability exposure through policy and internationally accepted best practices.
- Community advocacy and involvement.

The agency has been accredited through CALEA since 1996. Every four years a team of CALEA Assessors arrive at our headquarters to conduct an on-site assessment of the department's written protocol, standard operating procedure, written reports, facility and personnel. They look at the avenue in which the department conducts day-to-day business both in house and out on the street to ensure compliance with the 460 standards of the law enforcement program.

In 2010, the department was honored with the coveted "Flagship" status which identifies the agency and its members as exemplary examples of law enforcement service. In December 2016, a team of Assessors recommended this agency for re-accreditation status after an on-site assessment. The Certificate of Advanced Meritorious Accreditation this agency received is it's eight successful assessment from CALEA. The next scheduled on site assessment by CALEA is in December 2020.



New York State Accreditation



The New York State Law Enforcement Accreditation Program is a process that continues to evolve in ways that are consistent with the changing legal, social and fiscal developments. The process continuously evaluates and updates commonly accepted standards and provides a progressive and time proven way to improve overall performance.

In 1996, The Town of Manlius Police Department earned its initial New York State Law Enforcement Accreditation award and every five years undergoes an on-site assessment. The department was recently reassessed in 2016 and was once again recommended for reaccreditation. The department has received reaccreditation status continuously since 1996.

The next scheduled onsite assessment by New York State is in the year 2021.

Special Investigations Section (SIS)



The Special Investigations Section (SIS) serves as the primary support to the Field Services Section. Working together SIS provides enhanced investigative efforts into complex or time intensive cases.

SIS maintains primary responsibility for:

- Suspicious death investigations
- Case property management
- Collection and preservation of evidence
- Narcotic sales investigations
- Organized crime investigations
- Intelligence gathering, analysis & dissemination
- Surveillance operations
- Liaison with the Onondaga County D. A.'s office
- Confidential source registration and management
- Time intensive investigations

SIS also encompasses:

- Family Services Officer (FSO)
- School Information Resource Officer's (SIRO's)
- Community Relations
- Crime Prevention
- Public Relations

SIS investigators receive specialized training to increase their knowledge in areas such as:

- Interview techniques
- Search warrants
- Search & seizure laws

In 2017 SIS was assigned 74 cases, and assisted the Field Services Section (FSS) with 45 cases. Assistance to the FSS included: performing interviews of suspects, victims and witnesses, conducting pawn shop checks for stolen property, submitting bulletins to the Onondaga Crime Analysis Center, providing forensic examinations of cellular telephones and other electronic devices, authoring search warrants, conducting computerized voice stress analysis examinations of suspects, handling juvenile cases and performing evidence technician duties at crime scenes. Overall, 88% of the assigned cases were closed by arrest or other means.

Noteworthy SIS investigations from 2017 include:

- A rash of car larcenies in the central portion of the Town which resulted in an arrest and the recovery of over 40 items of property. The subject was charged with Felony level Criminal Mischief and Misdemeanor Criminal Possession of Stolen Property.
- A burglary involving an unoccupied residence that was burglarized three times within a two month period. The investigation culminated with the arrest of the subject who was charged with Burglary, Criminal Mischief, Petit Larceny and Criminal Possession of Stolen Property.
- Investigation into counterfeit \$100 bills used at stores in the Town. The investigation resulted in the arrest of three subjects who were charged with Felony level Forgery, Conspiracy, Criminal Possession of a Forged Instrument, Criminal Possession of Stolen Property and Misdemeanor Petit Larceny. This investigation revealed that the subjects had committed the same types of crimes in the Towns of Dewitt, Colonie and New Hartford. The subjects were also wanted for similar type crimes by the N.Y. City Police Department and the N.Y.S. Police. The U.S. Secret Service was also involved in this incident due to the multiple uses of counterfeit bills throughout New York State.
- Assistance to the Onondaga County D. A.'s Office, the Onondaga and Madison County Sheriff's Office, the Towns of Camillus, Dewitt and Geddes, the N.Y.S. Police, N.Y.S. Parks Police, N.Y.S. Bureau of Narcotics, N.Y.S. Department of Motor Vehicle Investigators, the U.S. Secret Service, Immigration and Customs Enforcement, U.S. Postal Inspectors and The Federal Bureau of Investigation. Assistance provided included interviewing suspects, evidence technician work, forensic cell phone and other types of electronic devices examinations, intelligence information and assistance with warrant executions within the Town.

School Information Resource Officers (SIRO's)



School Information Resource Officers (SIRO's) maintain a full time presence in both the ES-M and F-M schools located within the township. The SIRO's meet daily with students and staff both formally and informally to provide training, consultation, and crisis intervention. The four SIROs also visit classrooms in their respective districts to provide education to the students on various topics.

High school programs may include the following:

- **Alive at 25 and driver's education:** A course designed to teach teen drivers the consequences of risky driving behaviors which attribute to a high number of traffic accidents, injuries and death.
- **Mock DWI:** Re-enactment of a DWI crash with serious injuries and death associated with the accident. Designed to make a significant impact on the students as to the dangers of drinking and driving.
- **Health Classes:** Topics include the effects of drugs and alcohol, criminal activity associated with drug use and addictions, and how to handle situations students may or may not encounter regarding drugs and alcohol.
- **Personal safety:** Students were taught techniques to stay aware of their surroundings and learned basic self defense techniques to combat an attacker.
- **Career presentations:** SIROs presented in numerous classes regarding the required training and education necessary to become a police officer and the career options available within the field.
- **Government/Law classes:** Information provided to students in various law topics such as, search and seizure, interview & interrogation, MHL 941 and mental health issues and use of force.
- **Lockdown Drills:** Aimed to encourage staff and students to take lockdown drills seriously, SIRO's and Patrol Officers participated in several school lockdown drills. Participation in these drills helps to ensure schools are following procedures and protocols.

Middle School Programs may include the following topics:

- **Bullying:** Presentations on the consequences for bullying and cyber-bullying and what to do if a student is being bullied or knows someone who is being bullied.
- **Drugs and Alcohol:** The dangers of using drugs and consuming alcohol are taught. Drug laws and the effects of drugs on a community are also taught.
- **Internet Safety:** Internet usage and social media applications and how making poor choices on the internet can effect a persons future. Special emphasis is placed on the sending of inappropriate pictures as well as threats of any kind.

Elementary School Programs may include the following topics:

- **General Safety:** Age appropriate safety topics are taught in all grades.
- **Halloween Safety:** SIRO participation in Halloween parades and Halloween safety rules are taught at this level.
- **Wellness Days / Picnics:** SIRO participation in special events enables them to make positive connections with staff and students.

Family Services Officer (FSO)



The Family Services Officer (FSO) has primary responsibility for family and juvenile matters to include investigating crimes perpetrated by or against juveniles, child endangerment and neglect complaints, domestic violence incidents and investigations into complaints of elder abuse or neglect. This position allows for an officer to receive specialized training to better equip them to effectively handle sensitive matters involving juveniles, victims and the elderly population. Many crisis' involve long term assistance and guidance which may not be conducive with the daily schedule of patrol officer. The FSO has the resources, time and dedication to fully focus on the needs of these individuals.

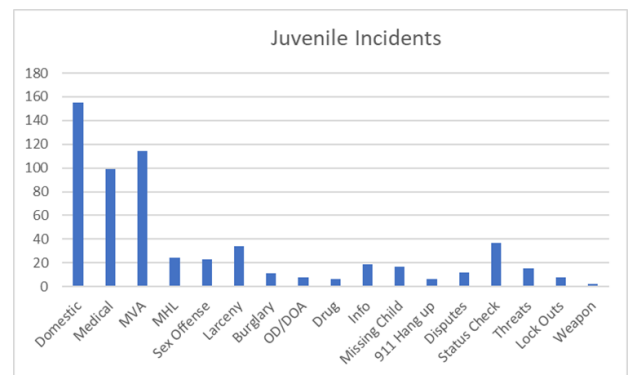
The FSO is responsible for implementing programs designed to prevent delinquency, substance abuse and victimization along with responding to the request for education and specialized presentations from community groups. The FSO receives requests from the local Boy Scout and Girl Scout troops, BOCES New Dimensions, local senior citizen residential facilities, the YMCA, Town and Village recreation departments, Village libraries, local Day Care and Pre-School programs, Fayetteville-Manlius and East Syracuse-Minoa School Districts, and area church groups.

In order to properly service the community, the FSO maintains a liaison with various programs within the community, along with county funded programs designed to assist with long term solutions for families and victims. The following is a list of commonly used programs:

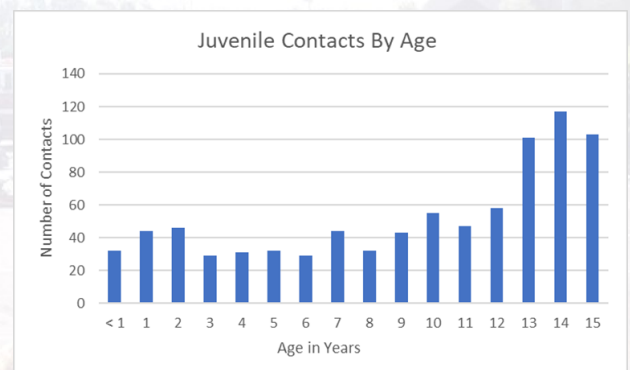
- **ACCESS Team**—Single point access for youth aged 5 years old to 21 experiencing emotional and behavioral challenges
- **Adult Protective Service (APS)** - Social services program that serves older adults who are in need of assistance.
- **Child Protective Services (CPS)**
- **Vera House**—Sexual assault and domestic violence service agency
- **Cyber Justice Diversion Program**—Educational diversion program for youth involved in inappropriate use of cell phones or the internet
- **Project Concern**—Juvenile fire starters program
- **East Area Support Network**—Committee created to address mental health and addiction issues in the community

The FSO generates a yearly Juvenile Enforcement and Prevention Programs report which details incidents involving juveniles (persons less than 16 years old). It was noted that between January 1, 2017 and December 31st, 2017 the Town of Manlius Police responded to 593 calls for service which involved approximately 893 juveniles.

The following graph illustrates the types of calls for service officers responded to when interacting with the juveniles in our community.



The below graphs shows a break down of the juvenile contacts by age. It is clear to see that juveniles aged 13-15 years old make up the largest percentage of the juvenile contacts (38%).



In 2017, a total of 17 juveniles were arrested where their cases were forwarded to the Onondaga County Family Court. 10 of the 17 arrests were considered property crimes accounting for 59% of the total juvenile arrests. The other arrests involved drugs, weapons, threats and assaults.

Administrative Division

The Administrative Division is responsible for providing the administrative support services necessary for the effective and efficient operation of the police department, to include:

- Fiscal and property management / Inventory control
- Personnel functions, to include recruiting and training
- Law enforcement accreditation
- Planning and research
- Crime analysis
- Police vehicle acquisition and maintenance

Internal Affairs (IA) ensures that all complaints against the agency, its activities and practices, and its members are investigated fully and fairly. IA investigations include internal (from within the department), external (from outside sources). Internal complaints include routine investigation of preventable police vehicle accidents, all firearms discharges and uses of force.

In 2015, a mutual aid agreement between the Town of Manlius and the Town of Dewitt Police Departments was implemented for the sharing of resources for investigating major accidents. In doing so, these two departments share personnel and equipment for better response times, as well as the costs associated with these types of investigations.

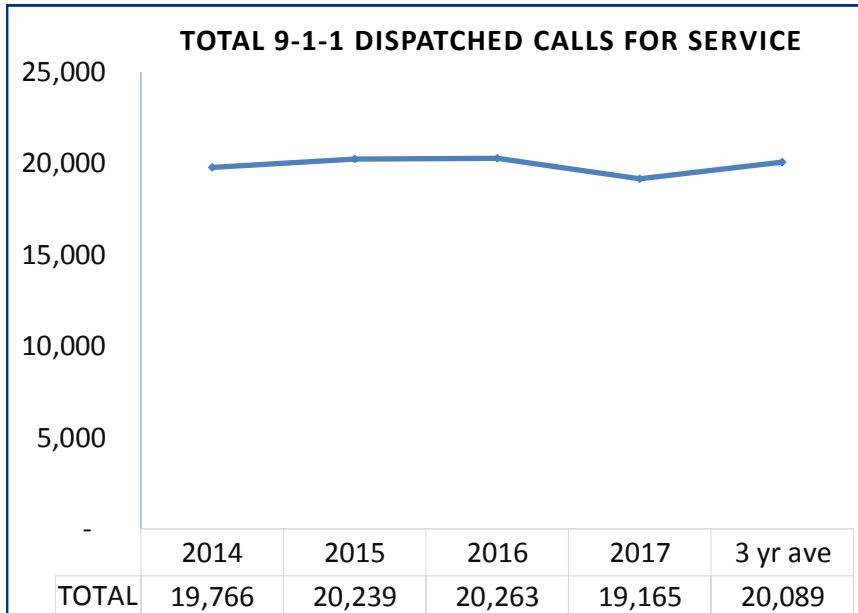
A review of the total reported accidents for 2017 reveals a decrease of 7.79 % in preventable MVC's in comparison to the total number of preventable MVC's in 2016. This review also shows a 4.97% decrease in preventable MVC's when compared to the average of the past three years.

The Town of Manlius Police Department's continued goal is to ensure the safety of all motorists operating within the jurisdiction. The department utilizes traffic enforcement as a tool to reduce personal injury and property damage to the pedestrian, cycling and the motoring public.

The Town of Manlius Police Department maintains a multifaceted program to address aggressive driving traits. One of the ways the agency addresses these traits is to use statistical data from crash investigation reports. These reports are analyzed monthly for causational factors, locations, and times of occurrence and the data is then vetted for patterns. After a comprehensive review, a selective enforcement campaign then targets the top causes, locations, and times where preventable motor vehicle crashes (MVC's) are occurring. The program also looks at all neighborhood traffic complaints and targets these areas as well. These types of operations include public and social media campaigns, roadway signage, and strict vehicle and traffic enforcement. Aggressive driving includes failure to yield the right of way, following too closely, unsafe lane change, unsafe passing, disregard of traffic signals & signs, using electronic devices while driving, failing to signal and driving under the influence of alcohol and/or drugs. Efforts targeted at aggressive driving violations resulted in an increase of traffic tickets written for aggressive driving.

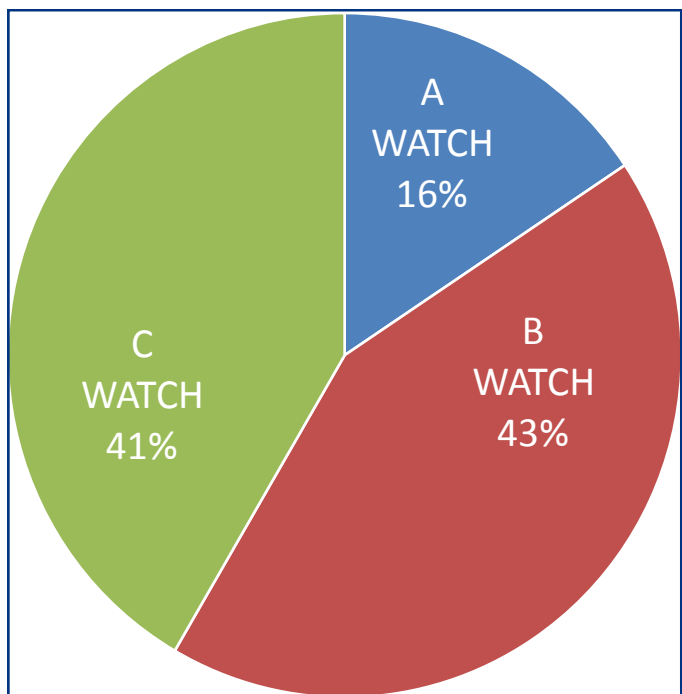

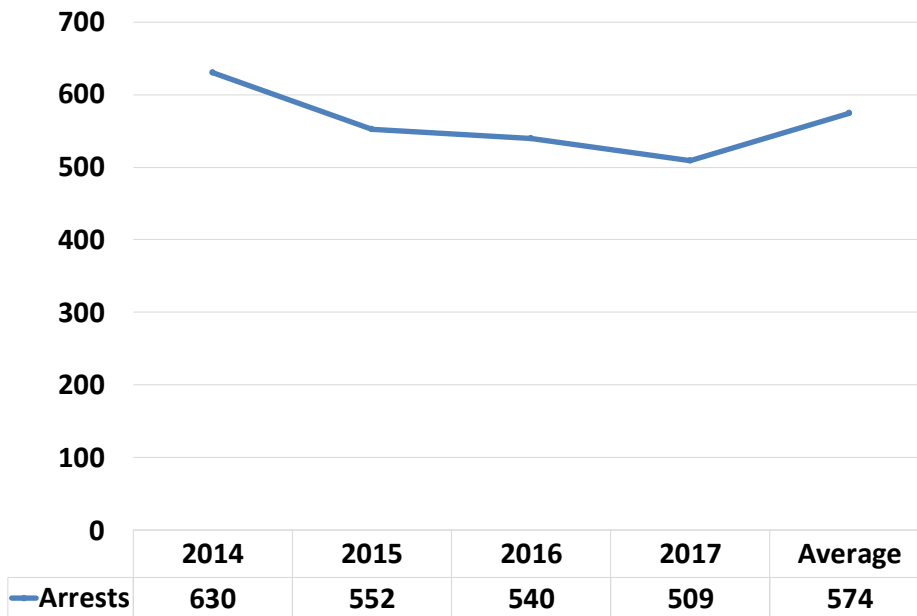

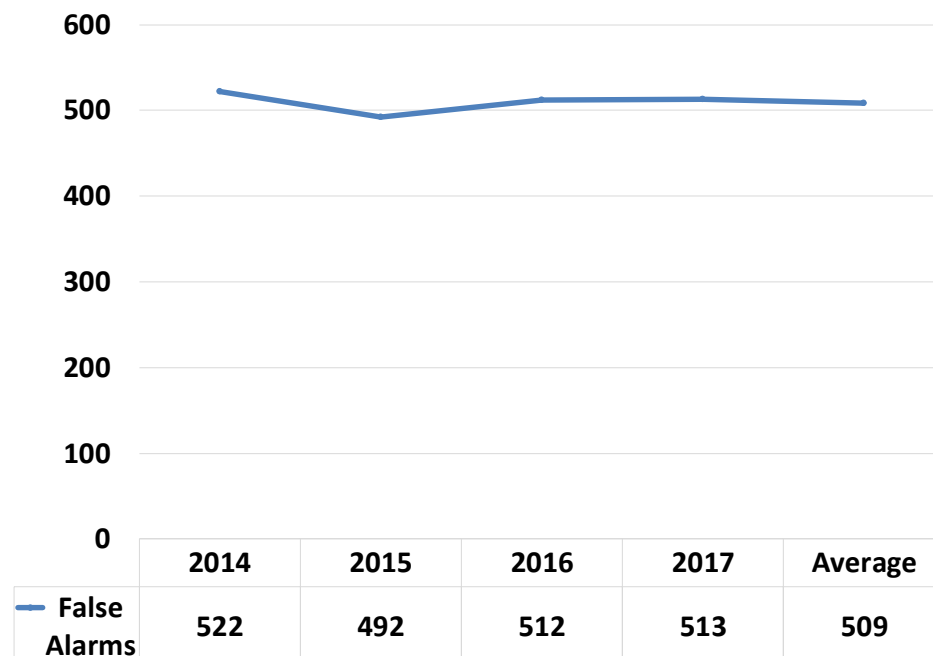
Total Arrests & False Alarms

Uniform Crime Reporting (UCR)

The charts below include only those crimes that have a reporting value for 2017 along with the number of cleared offenses in each category.

In 2017, 361 UCR Part 1 crimes were reported and 30% of these were cleared by arrest or other means. Overall, 80% of the UCR Part 1 crimes reported were larcenies and 15% were burglaries.

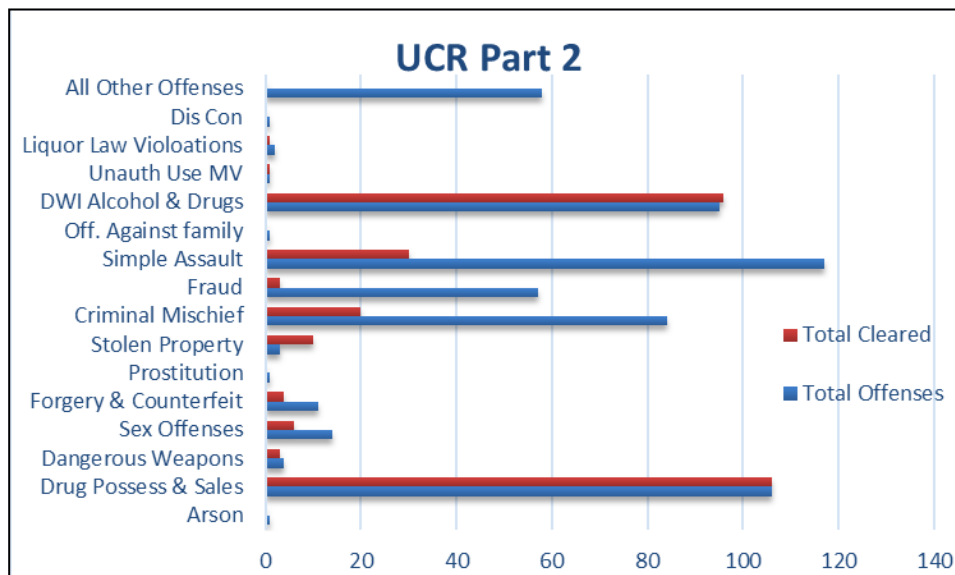
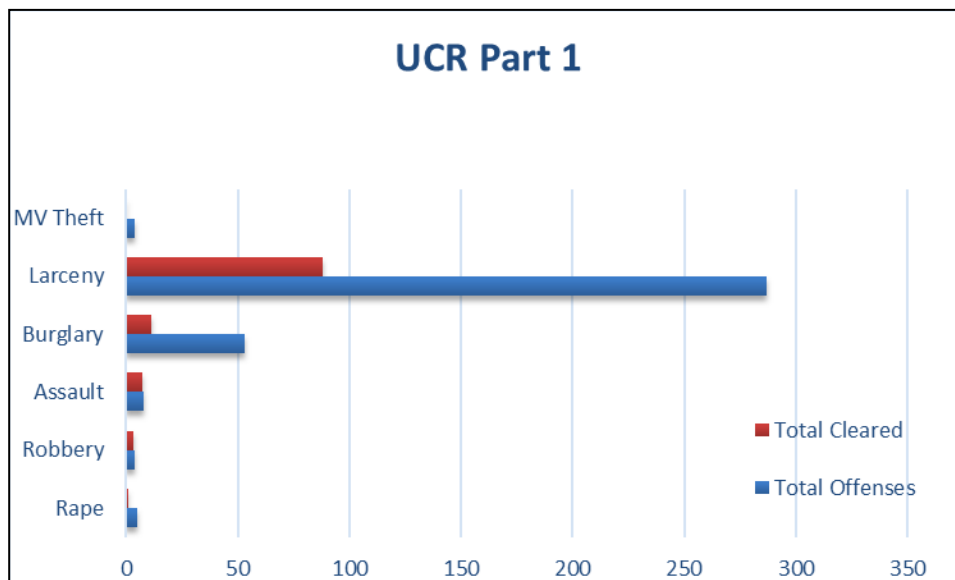
There were 556 UCR Part 2 crimes reported for 2017. Overall, 19% of the UCR Part 2 crimes reported were drug possession or sales, 15% were reported as criminal mischiefs, 10% were reported as fraud, 21% were reported as simple assaults and 17% were reported as DWI's. Overall, 50% of UCR Part 2 offenses were cleared by arrest or other means.
